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

Day 1: Oaks Broome, Broome (Fri, 28 May)

Day Itinerary

Welcome to Broome! Upon arrival at Broome Airport, collect your baggage and meet your Swagman Tours driver and guide. You will then transfer to the Oaks Broome Hotel. Enjoy the afternoon to settle into your hotel. Oaks Broome will be our home for the next three nights.



Clinging to the peninsula overhanging the gorgeous Roebuck Bay, the historic outback town of Broome is the largest town in the vast area of Kimberley. Known for its colourful gardens, gorgeous powder-white beaches lapped by crystal-clear turquoise waters, and an abundance of frangipani and coconut trees, Broome offers an oasis of paradise in an otherwise desolate landscape. A thriving community of artists and entrepreneurs have set up an impressive host of galleries, craft stores, quaint cafes and breweries. The town boasts an unusual fusion of colonial Australian and Asian architectural styles, some remarkably friendly locals, and a vibrant Saturday morning market in the immaculate tropical gardens of the Court House. With its world-famous beaches, its wonderfully relaxing atmosphere and its exceptionally scenic natural surroundings, Broome is the perfect place to 'slip into Broome time' - as the locals say.

Overnight: Oaks Broome

Occupying a central position in the heart of Roebuck Bay is deluxe resort property Oaks Broome, promising a touch of subtle luxury and style when visiting this vibrant Outback town. A favourite among business travellers and holidaymakers who appreciate their modern apartments, thoughtful appointments and serene atmosphere, Oaks Broome provides the perfect launching point from which to explore a variety of natural treasures, alluring landscapes and adventure pursuits.

Oaks Broome is within walking distance to a bevy of nearby boutiques and popular tourism attractions and features two swimming pools with bountiful deck chairs and umbrellas, and extensive conference facilities. Free car parking is also available. Just five minutes from the airport and Broome Town Centre, and 15 minutes from Cable Beach, this resort property is ideal for those wanting to soak up the best of Broome in the form of both short and longer stays.



Day 2: Oaks Broome, Broome (Sat, 29 May)

Day Itinerary

This morning you'll see the highlights of Broome including Chinatown, the Sun outdoor theatre, the Japanese Pearl Divers Cemetery, Antastasia's Pool, Gantheaume Point and the Dinosaur's footprints. After lunch, activities will involve visiting Roebuck Plains Station which is a pastoral lease located close to Town and is able to support 20,000 head of cattle plus seeing the marshalling/loading of cattle from Broome Port (subject to confirmation) for the live export trade into the Pacific Rim, Middle East and South East Asia. Dinner out this evening (own expense).

Day 3: Oaks Broome, Broome (Sun, 30 May)

Day Itinerary

A free day for private sightseeing. Maybe take the opportunity to go fishing. The day is yours to do as you please and to soak up the colour and atmosphere of this pearling town or alternatively see the below options:

WILLIE CREEK – PEARL LUGGERS

Make your way to the departure point for your 1½ hr Pearl Luggers Tour. View some of the last remaining pearl luggers in Broome. Enjoy fascinating guided commentary and learn about the history of pearling in Broome. See, touch and hold some of the most valuable and rare pearling, diving and mother of pearl artefacts and then enjoy and exclusive pearl meat tasting.

HORIZONTAL FALLS OPTIONAL TOUR – AM / PM HALF DAY or FULL DAY

Fly from Broome to Horizontal Falls on board a Seaplane and enjoy a spectacular landing on the calm waters of Talbot Bay. Transfer to fast boat and enjoy the experience the incredible tidal power of this natural phenomenon as you are taken through the falls. Enjoy breakfast or lunch on the houseboat. Experience the thrill of swimming in the huge croc/shark free cage while feeding the friendly fish. Have your cameras ready as you take off from Talbot Bay for our return flight. Fly at 200m over hundreds of islands of the Buccaneer Archipelago and Cape Leveque before heading south along the coast of the Dampier Peninsula over Lombadina, Beagle Bay, Carnot Bay, Willie Creek & Cable Beach prior to landing in Broome. **Tour Cost from A\$900 pp TBC.** Alternatively a full day Horizontal Falls tour is available travelling by 4WD along the Dampier Peninsula to see the Beagle Bay church, Cape Leveque and One Arm Point where you board the seaplane to view the falls as per above. **Tour Cost from A\$945 pp TBC.** Tours must be booked and paid in full to Swagman Tours prior to departure. **There are strictly limited vacancies and they fill very quickly; if you wish book a seat, please advise Swagman immediately.**

Day 4: Spinifex Hotel, Derby (Mon, 31 May)**Day Itinerary**

After breakfast we leave Broome behind us, travel east along the Great Northern Highway toward the small settlement of Derby. Along the way see the 1000 year old Prison Boab Tree and the Myall Stock Trough plus the circular wharf overlooking picturesque King Sound. Time permitting, visit Liveringa Station. A pastoral lease operating as a cattle station with capacity of carrying over 22,000 head of cattle and has a 100km frontage on the Fitzroy River. Arrive at Spinifex Hotel and check in for overnight stay.



Situated on the edge of the King Sound, in Western Australia's Kimberley Region, Derby is a outback town, which serves as a popular stopover for travellers heading into the gorge country of the vast north. The town is also the primary gateway to Gibb River Road, the Windjana Gorge National Park, the Tunnel Creek National Park, and the remote little islands of the Buccaneer Archipelago. One of Derby's main attractions is the huge Boab Prison Tree which is thought to be about 1500 years old. Other popular attractions include the Wharfingers House Museum, the Botanical Gardens, the Old Derby Gaol, and an art gallery showcasing some interesting Aboriginal art and design.

Overnight: Spinifex Hotel

The Spinifex is an iconic hotel in the Kimberley. Recently rejuvenated by the new management, the "Spini" is a jewel in the crown of WA's top end. The Hotel provides guests with a range of facilities including a full bar, restaurant, and TAB, plus brand new motel style accommodation, swimming pool, BBQ's, and a conference room.

There are many reasons for visiting Derby on business or for pleasure. For instance, the town serves as a regional administrative and supply centre. However, most visitors are more interested in the Buccaneer Archipelago, Horizontal Waterfall, boab trees, the Gibb River Road, Windjana Gorge National Park, Tunnel Creek, Wharfinger's House Museum... And the list goes on.

Day 5: Fitzroy River Lodge, Fitzroy Crossing (Tue, 1 June)

Day Itinerary

This morning after breakfast, Travel along the eastern end of the Lennard Ranges to visit Tunnel Creek to walk through the underground stream, marvelling at this unique stream in its arid environment. See freshwater crocodiles in the pools then continue to Gorge. On with the walking shoes for a stroll into the gorge – a fossilised barrier reef with spectacular walls soaring 90 metres above the riverbed. Time permitting and subject to acceptance we may be able to squeeze in a visit to the iconic Fossil Downs Station. Continue your journey, ending the day travelling to our next accommodation where you will have a Safari tent experience (private ensuites).



Set on the banks of the mighty Fitzroy River, in the Kimberley region of Western Australia, Fitzroy Crossing is a quintessential Australian outback town. This small settlement services local stations and acts as a convenient stopover for travellers exploring the scenic Kimberley area or those en-route to the Bungle Bungles Purnululu National Park, or Kununurra and Darwin. The town also serves as an ideal base for visiting the nearby Geikie Gorge National Park, a scenic waterway with towering cliffs and abundant wildlife; Tunnel Creek, an impressive cave system decorated with aboriginal rock paintings and speleothems; and Windjana Gorge, one of the Kimberley area's most beautiful gorges.

Overnight: Fitzroy River Lodge

Fitzroy River Lodge is situated deep in the heart of the Kimberley, on the banks of the mighty Fitzroy River. The river lodge is an ideal accommodation choice for the dedicated holidaymaker, weary traveller, expectant adventurer or corporate guest. At the lodge, guests can relax on fifty acres of natural bush with shady trees and landscaped gardens.

Day 6: Kimberley Hotel, Halls Creek (Wed, 2 June)

Day Itinerary

Have an early breakfast before checking out and departing for a 1hr Boat Cruise on Danggu Geikie Gorge.

Enjoy views of the spectacular multi-coloured 30 metre deep cliffs carved by the floodwaters of the Fitzroy River through the Devonian fossil reef.

You will be given an insight into the wildlife and geology of the gorge and birds such as sea eagles and rare purple-crowned fairy-wrens may be observed along with acrobatic crocodiles snapping at stray flying-foxes.

After your tour, travel toward the historic township of Halls Creek, a busy service town for surrounding pastoralists, Aboriginal communities and travellers. Upon arrival travel out to the original Old Halls Creek site where gold was discovered in 1885 and see the crumbling mud brick ruins plus the China Wall – a natural quartzite formation. Also visit the statue in the town park known as 'Russian Jack' and hear about his heroic act journey to the Kimberley Hotel in Halls creek. Enjoy dinner and an overnight stay.



Situated in the heart of the outback on the edges of the Tanami and the Great Sandy Deserts, in the East Kimberley region of Western Australia, the old gold rush town of Halls Creek is the final destination along the well-known Canning Stock Route.

This bustling hub serves as a major centre for numerous cattle stations in the area as well as the local indigenous communities. Halls Creek is the gateway to a variety of world-famous natural attractions including: the nearby well-preserved Wolfe Creek Crater, and the spectacular Bungle Bungle Mountain Ranges of Purnululu National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage site.

Overnight: Kimberley Hotel

The Kimberley Hotel is conveniently located adjacent to the local airport and approximately 500 meters away from the town center. It offers stylish Kimberley accommodations and boasts large motel units. Set among maintained gardens, with wide verandas and pathways that connect the accommodation building to the reception complex, the Kimberley Hotel is an oasis in the rugged outback landscape. Hotel facilities include an attractive colonial style sports lounge, saloon bar, cocktail bar, restaurant and in ground pool.

Day 7: Emma Gorge Resort, The Kimberley (Thu, 3 June)

Day Itinerary

Depart Halls Creek and travel towards our next accommodation at Emma George Resort. Along the way cross over the Ord River. The Ord River is a significant Australian waterway with beautiful scenery & wildlife. Arrive at your accommodation for a 2 night stay and immerse yourself in the picturesque landscape of the rocky, red Cockburn Ranges.



The Kimberley is one of the world's last great wilderness areas. Sandwiched between a remarkably rugged coastline and hauntingly beautiful deserts in the northernmost region of Western Australia, the Kimberley is unfathomably vast - it encompasses an area approximately twice the size of the U.K! The majority of the region's inhabitants reside in small towns such as Kununurra and Wyndham in the east and Broome and Derby in the west.

The area offers an unprecedented abundance of natural wonders including sprawling spinifex plains dotted with boabs, palm-clad gorges, breathtaking waterfalls, towering mountain peaks and the incredible UNESCO world heritage Purnululu National Park, with its multitude of unusual dome-shaped sandstone formations. Other popular tourist attractions in the area include: numerous aboriginal paintings, some of which are believed to be around 50 000 years old; Broome's famous Cable Beach, where visitors can admire the sunset while riding camels; and the renowned Windjana Gorge National Park, which is brimming with incredible gorges featuring a host of perfectly preserved prehistoric fossils.

Overnight: Emma Gorge Resort

With 60 safari-style tented cabins, with en-suites, this is a comfortable way for the whole family to sleep under canvas, while still being surrounded with a few home comforts. Hidden amid Kimberley's fiery red Cockburn Range this unique location brings nature to your doorstep, allowing you to immerse yourself in the nature, flora and fauna of the region with the added touches such as a swimming pool, onsite restaurant and WiFi. All tented cabins are powered and have fans, linen, towels and outdoor dining areas in the shade of ancient Boab trees. Tea and coffee making facilities are available for guests at the restaurant 24 hours a day. The stunning beauty of Emma Gorge, our most popular gorge walk, is on your doorstep.

Day 8: Emma Gorge Resort, The Kimberley (Fri, 4 June)

This morning is free to enjoy your surroundings, perhaps set off on the Emma Gorge walk, located on the edge of the resort - only a short walk from your tented cabin. After lunch travel to Bindoola Gorge and walk into this rugged and unique area. Enjoy sundowners overlooking the three fingers of the Cockburn Ranges this evening.

Day 9: Kununurra Lakeside Resort, Kununurra (Sat, 5 June)

Day Itinerary

Leaving Emma George behind us, we traverse El Questro Station and enjoy some time for a stroll in picturesque Zebedee Springs set among the palm trees, with its circular gorge wall and crystal clear thermal rock pool. Afterwards travel to the northernmost town of Wyndham and marvel at the view of the Kimberley, its rivers and Cambridge Gulf from the Five Rivers Lookout. Continue to Kununurra, our stay for the next 3 nights.



Located close to the confluence of the Ord and the Dunham rivers, in the far north of Western Australia, Kununurra is the largest town north of Broome. The town is set amongst rugged hills, mountain ranges, and abundant lakes. The main attraction in the area is Lake Argyle, Australia's largest artificial lake, which is just 70 kilometres south of Kununurra. Visitors can look forward to a wide variety of activities including: exploring the nearby Purnululu National Park, a World Heritage Site; soaking up a sunset view from Kelly's Knob viewpoint; or taking an exciting boat trip up the Ord River to spot crocodiles, kingfishers, eagles, bats and more. Other popular activities include: horse riding, fishing, swimming as well as 4x4 outback adventures and scenic flights.

Overnight: Kununurra Lakeside Resort

Kununurra Lakeside Resort is situated alongside the stunningly unique Lily Creek Lagoon, 2 km away from the town center. It offers a tranquil relaxing environment to stay in while exploring the raw wildness of the Kimberley region. Set among three acres of lush green lawns, at the lake's edge, the property houses 24 premier king rooms, 18 self catering rooms and 8 standard motel rooms. All rooms are air conditioned with en suite bathrooms, remote control TV, refrigerator, tea, coffee and ironing facilities.

Day 10: Kununurra Lakeside Resort, Kununurra (Sun, 6 June)

Day Itinerary

This morning our local guide joins us for a tour of the town itself, the Ord River irrigation scheme farms, Ivanhoe Crossing, Diversion Dam, Indian sandalwood plantations, hybrid seed production plus chia, melon and pumpkin crops.

Later, travel out to see the relocated homestead of the pioneering Durack family, then board your cruise boat for the 55km cruise along the Ord River from the dam wall at Lake Argyle back into Kununurra township. Marvel at the spectacular scenery, wildlife, flora and fauna found along the way, including the elusive freshwater crocodile! Enjoy afternoon tea at our riverside camp before a spectacular Kimberley sunset. Dinner will be at own expense this evening.

Day 11: Kununurra Lakeside Resort, Kununurra (Mon, 7 June)

Day Itinerary

After breakfast you may wish to join an optional excursion today (additional expense).

Alternatively, simply have a day to explore at leisure. Dinner will be at own expense this evening.

ORD RIVER, BUNGLE BUNGLE & LAKE ARGYLE 2 HOUR SCENIC FLIGHT

Enjoy a morning Ord River, Bungle Bungle & Lake Argyle Experience inc. landing on Lake Argyle for morning tea! After being collected from accommodation you will be transferred to the departure point.

Taking off from the water's edge in a Kimberley Air Tours float plane, see the Ord River Irrigation Area, the mighty Ord River and Spillway Creek, the overflow for Lake Argyle. From the air, you will view the Durack Family Homestead, Argyle Downs and the Ord River Hydro power station in action below the Ord Top Dam wall. Continue your adventure down the full 60km expanse of Lake Argyle. Learning about the cattle and mining industries as you pass over working Kimberley cattle stations and the Bow River Diamond Mine. Admire the 240,000 ha Purnululu National Park, as the Bungle Bungle massif rises 300m out of the desert to meet you. Discover the awe inspiring striped bee hive domes and the famous Cathedral Gorge and Piccaninny Gorge as you orbit the range and see the Argyle Diamond Mine, the largest producer of pink and coloured diamonds in the world and the Carr Boyd range on your return to Kununurra. Appreciate Lake Argyle from a whole new perspective as you experience the thrill of a water landing in the float plane, disembark the plane onto a remote island and enjoy a selection of locally made cakes and a cup of tea or coffee whilst taking the opportunity to spot some local wildlife.

BUNGLE BUNGLE WANDERER FULL DAY

Start your day with a one-hour scenic flight from Kununurra in an air-conditioned, high wing aeroplane flying over the Ord Irrigation Area, the Ord Top Dam wall, Lake Kununurra and the full expanse of Lake Argyle. View the Carr Boyd Ranges, Osmand Ranges, the Ord River and Bow River.

Experience spectacular aerial views of the Bungle Bungle in the Purnululu National Park. Land at a remote unsealed airfield in the Purnululu National Park and transfer to an airconditioned 4WD bus, your local guide will drive you closer to the Bungle Bungle Range and explain the significance of this World Heritage listed area to the traditional owners. Enjoy a moderate 3km guided walk amongst the famous eroded towers and black and orange banded beehive structures on the Domes Walk. Your guide will take you into Cathedral Gorge, where towering cliffs open up to form a space with awe inspiring natural acoustics, here you will rest and enjoy your lunch.

Walk along the bed of Piccaninny Creek, which flows only in the Monsoon waterfall season. Learn about the Kimberley climate, the six seasons and unique flora and fauna so important to the traditional custodians of the land.

Return via a scenic flight to Kununurra, on the way viewing the Argyle Diamond Mine where rare pink diamonds are mined.

Day 12: Knotts Crossing Resort, Katherine (Tue, 8 June)**Day Itinerary**

Leaving Kununurra behind us, we cross the border into the Northern Territory before stopping off at Timber Creek on the mighty Victoria River. Pass through some of the largest station properties in the Top End before reaching your accommodation where you will check in for 2 nights. Enjoy dinner at the property upon your arrival.



Katherine is a serene town located just outside the borders of the Nitmiluk National Park, which is owned by the indigenous Jawoyn Aboriginal people and jointly managed with the local Parks and Wildlife Commission. Tourists use Katherine as a base from which to explore the Edith Falls, scenic Jatbula Trail and the Cutta Cutta Caves Nature Park. Alternatively, visit the Top Didj Cultural Experience to take in authentic Aboriginal art and culture, relax in the crystal clear Katherine Hot Springs, or take a walk along the river bed on a path that leads to Katherine Low level Nature Reserve.

Overnight: Knotts Crossing Resort

Knotts Crossing Resort, is situated in the picturesque Katherine Region of Australia's Northern Territory. Approximately 320 kms from Darwin and Kakadu National Park in the Top End of Australia, the resort is set amongst acres of stunning tropical gardens and is just a two minute walk from the Katherine River. Knotts Crossing Resort offers a range of comfortable, well priced options for accommodation including suites, cabins, caravans and camping. Facilities at the resort include a restaurant, bar, outdoor garden bar, two swimming pools, three outdoor barbeques, two huest laundries, wireless internet and wake up calls. Katherine's town centre is just a 10 minute stroll and has a shopping complex, tourist information centre, boutique shopping, a cinema, restaurants and cafes.

Day 13: Knotts Crossing Resort, Katherine (Wed, 9 June)

Day Itinerary

Local managers of Elders and Landmark will assist in organizing property visits today. Properties will most likely be commercial cattle producers with stock bred for the live export trade. We will also visit the Katherine Research Station to see their research and development on pasture/grass management along with an export feed cubing plant, export stock yards and handling facility plus see the pivot irrigation area growing feed for the cube plant. Later in the day visit the Katherine Ag College to see a practical outback educational experience.

Day 14: Travelodge Resort Darwin, Darwin (Thu, 10 June)

Day Itinerary

This morning we depart for Darwin. We head along the Stuart Highway towards Edith Falls, a series of cascading waterfalls and pools on the Edith River. We then continue on the solemn but beautiful Adelaide River War Cemetery to see the military graves honoring those killed in the bombing of Darwin. Upon arrival at the check into your hotel and enjoy dinner and overnight stay.



Darwin is a tropical seaport in the Northern Territory of Australia that serves as a convenient access point to Katherine Gorge, Kakadu National Park and Litchfield National Park. The city is a melting pot of different cultures, with more than 50 nationalities represented here. With a strong Asian influence, you can expect a kaleidoscope of cuisines and a cultural blend of Thai, Sri Lankan, Japanese, Indian, Chinese and Malaysian. Darwin's city centre buzzes with a lively tourist vibe, while unique museums celebrate the city's past and galleries showcase the region's rich indigenous art. Sail to the intriguing Tiwi Islands, take a speedboat ride or go fishing in a tinny – the local version of a small boat.

Overnight: Travelodge Resort Darwin

Surrounded by tropical gardens, with swimming pools and a waterfall at its centre, Travelodge Resort Darwin offers a tropical oasis in the heart of Darwin city centre. Free WiFi is provided.

All rooms are air-conditioned and include cable TV, in-room safe, bathroom with shower, and a refrigerator. Some accommodation features a kitchenette and separate lounge/dining area.

Guests at Travelodge Resort Darwin can relax by the swimming pools surrounded by palm trees. Facilities include a fitness room and a 24-hour reception.

Day 15: Travelodge Resort Darwin, Darwin (Fri, 11 June)

Day Itinerary

This morning a representative from the Northern Territory Cattleman's Council will speak about the state of play of the pastoral industry in the Top End (subject to confirmation). Afterwards travel out of Darwin to visit an export mango farm that produces mangoes and starfruit to supply the major supermarkets throughout the country. After lunch travel to Berry Springs and visit the Territory Wildlife Park in time to see the Birds of Prey presentation.

This expansive park has three main areas; the Wetlands with its aquarium, lagoons and billabongs housing tropical fish, turtles, and both species of crocodile. A Monsoon Vine Forest which hosts a 1km boardwalk gently lifting toward the canopy of natural bushland to view the array of birdlife and finally a Woodland area that includes a Nocturnal house, where you have the opportunity to see animals rarely seen in the wild. This evening is free to dine out (own expense).
